I would also like to extend a warm welcome to the students, families and staff to another year replete with learning experiences, especially to the ones who are new to our school community.

With the number of enrolments received recently, it is clear that parents and members of the community highly regard AIC-Adelaide as a centre of quality of education for their children. Due to increase in student numbers, we opened a third reception class and a third year 7 class. For this, new teachers were employed in both primary and middle school.

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome Ms Hadiya Hanifi, Ms Zahra Fathi and Mr Hayatullah Khan in the Middle School. In the Primary School, Ms Abbey Evans, Ms Christine Koekemoer and Ms Alison Jansen have settled well in the current Reception classes and year 4 class. Ms Samah Almasri, Ms Dalia Saleh joined our Arabic & Islamic Department. To support with well-being, Ms Anamta Afzal started as our school counsellor this year.

A new initiative at AIC-Adelaide is planning for the Quicksmart program. QuickSmart is an evidence-based basic skills intervention program designed for students who experience persistent difficulties in literacy and/or numeracy. We are currently in the process of organising the introduction of the program to our year 4 to year 9 students who require extra support to join the mainstream students' groups.

The National Assessment Program for Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) has been held much earlier this year, with all students completing the tests online. For students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9, these tests will provide a snapshot of how they are progressing according to national benchmarks. I would like to thank all staff involved for their efforts in organisation and invigilation.

As always, AIC, Adelaide aims to provide a well-rounded educational experience for our students including involvement in co-curricular activities. This term, our students participated in PCR and Gel Electrophoresis workshops, Animals Anonymous sessions, AFL Diversity Trials, Tertiary Studies and Careers Expo, SACE Art Show, Senior 3v3 Basketball, Warrawong Sanctuary Excursion, play performance, River Journey incursion with Flinders University, excursion to Museum of Discovery and High School Sports Day. We also celebrated Harmony Day, 2022 Dux assembly and Shujaa Award Assembly.

Keeping in mind our Islamic ethos, the AIC students never back away from helping other Muslim brothers and sisters in need. The Year 12 organised a fundraiser sausage sizzle & Sunnah Day. Allhamdulillah with the support of students, parents and staff members, the students managed to raise \$10000 in donation to support our brothers and sisters, the Turkey-Syrian earthquake victims.

Since 2022, we have gradually been transitioning to starting our year 11 and year 12 academic year earlier. This year, the 2024 session for Years 11 and 12 will start at the beginning of Term 4. This is a great opportunity for our students to have a head start to their SACE journey. Please consider the importance of this opportunity for your child and ensure their attendance. According with the new academic timeline, our current year 11 students will sit their semester one exam in week 11 Term 1. The current year 10 students will sit their semester one exam mid of Term 2. We wish all our students the best as they embark on their final years of schooling.

Unfortunately, we are still being challenged by the impact of COVID-19. There has been an increase in the number of cases across the school. This has resulted in limiting the parent presence at school events as much as possible. We sincerely apologise for not inviting everyone for parent information nights and providing the information online instead. InshaAllah, we are hoping that in Term 2 we will be in a better position to welcome all families back at school events. I thank the community for their ongoing support and commitment to keep us all protected.

This term we also welcomed Mr Peter Daw, principal consultant for the next few weeks. Mr Peter is supporting the college in providing recommendations to continue improving the teaching and learning at AIC-Adelaide.

Allhamdulillah, we are welcoming Br Robert Mayze, our new Principal to our college. We are all looking forward to his experience in leading our school to further success. I would also sincerely like to thank all the staff members for their continual effort and support to our students on their learning journey.

Imam's Corner



Assalamu Alaikom Wa Rahmatu Allahe Wa Barakatuh,

Dear Parents/caregivers,

Inshallah you and your family are well and are in a high spirit of Eman. I want to take this opportunity to congratulate you on the commencement of the holy Month of Ramadan,

RAMADAN MUBARK to you and to your family.

Alhumdulillah the month of Ramadan is a month of worship and fasting, and it's also the month of brotherhood and unity. During our Fiday's Khutbas, and morning assembly reminders, our students were educated about the many important lessons to be learn from fasting, some of those lessons are:

Gaining Taqwaa:

As Allah SWT said: "O you who believe! Fasting is prescribed for you, as it was prescribed upon those before you in order that you may attain taqwaa." [Soorah al-Baqarah 2:183].

Fasting is a means of attaining taqwaa, since it helps prevent from many sins that one is prone to. Due to this, the Prophet sallallahu `alayhi wa sallam said: "Fasting is a shield with which the servant protects himself from the Fire."

Seeking Nearness to Allah:

Drawing closer to Allah SWT in this blessed month, can be achieved by fulfilling one's obligatory duties; and also reciting the Qur'aan and reflecting upon its meanings, increasing in kindness and in giving charity, in making du`aa to Allah, attending the taraweeh Prayer, seeking out Laylatul-Qadr, a night which is better than a thousand months, attending gatherings of knowledge, and striving in those actions that will cause the heart to draw closer to its Lord and to gain His forgiveness.

Acquiring Patience:

Fasting is a means of learning self-restraint and patience. With patience we are able to strengthen our resolve to worship Allah alone, with sincerity, and also cope with life's ups and downs.

Cultivating Good Manners: The Prophet sallallahu `alayhi wa sallam said: "Whosoever does not abandon falsehood in speech and action, then Allah the Mighty and Majestic has no need that he should leave his food and drink." This Hadith points towards the importance of truthfulness and good manners. Thus, this blessed month teaches us not only to abstain from food and drink, but to also abstain from such statements and actions that may be the cause of harming people and violating their rights – since the Messenger sallallahu `alayhi wa sallam said whilst describing the true Believer: "A Muslim is one from whom other Muslims are safe from his tongue and his hand."

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Sensing Muslim Unity:

The Prophet sallallahu `alayhi wa sallam said: "Fast when they fast, and break your fast when they break their fast, and sacrifice the day they sacrifice." Thus, in this blessed month we can sense an increased feeling of unity and of being a single Ummah due to our fasting and breaking our fast collectively. We also feel an increased awareness about the state of affairs of the Muslims and of the hardships that they endure, because: "During the fast, a Muslim feels and experiences what his needy and hungry brothers and sisters feel, who are forced to go without food and drink for many days

Let this month be a stepping stone towards a stronger bond, brotherhood and unity amongst us. Let it be a month of better understanding and closer ties amongst us all.

I once again say to you, Ramadan Mubarak, may Allah bless this month for you, your family and the entire Ummah. May Allah keep us all steadfast and united and keep away from us any form of division and disunity.

May Allah bring the hearts closer and protect all Muslims from any evil and harm.

It was very exciting to welcome our new Reception students on their 'BIG school' day. We look forward to working with everyone who is part of the Australian Islamic College Adelaide community.

JP & UP have end of term awards which recognise students for demonstrating Growth Mindset personalities, attitudes and behaviours including academics. To help our students become a hero we are providing you a list of helpful Do's:



Do get to school on time (8:30 am).

Do inform the office (parents) if your child is absent

Do keep us informed of any changes (Junior Primary parents) if your child is being picked up by anyone else other than you.

Do be respectful in class and follow all school rules.

Do wear the correct and clean uniform.

Do wear the correct school shoes and haircut (Islamically appropriate).

School Uniform

AIC Adelaide student are proud to wear their school uniform. Our students look smart in their uniform with their black leather (or leather style) shoes. We request our parents to kindly ensure that your child is always dressed in the correct uniform.

Boys must wear the AIC shirt with the logo along with grey pants. Girls in Junior Primary are to wear the long AIC tunic top with navy pants. Girls in Upper Primary must wear the AIC dress with the blue shirt underneath. Shoes must be black leather. Black fabric shoes/sneakers are not the correct shoes to wear.

We also expect our students to attend school with Islamically suitable haircuts. We thank our parents for your support in ensuring your child follows our school dress code.

Hats

In Terms 1 and 4, all students must wear a hat when they are outdoors. Every AIC Adelaide student is required to wear the AIC school hat to protect them from the sun. Students should wear hats that shade the face, neck and ears. Hats must be named, and can be kept at school.

Teachers will check that students have a hat. They will email you to remind you if they do not have one. All

students who do not have a hat will have to be in the shade. We are a sun smart school and our sun protection policy applies during Terms 1 and 4.

Parents please ensure that your child wears a school hat in Term 1 and Term 4 2023.

Class Dojo

As a communication platform, the primary will be using Class Dojo and the school platform (TASS) to build our community in and around every classroom. Teachers are able to share skills students are developing in classroom activities through photos, videos and messages which will be found on your year level Class Dojo. This also lets parents share in the moments of their child's day which they otherwise wouldn't see. Please ensure that not only are you connected to your child's Class Dojo but that you are checking messages from your child's teacher.

Label all school items

Please ensure that all items that come to school are labelled. We find or receive a large amount of lost property every day, and we cannot return them to your child if they are unnamed. This includes jackets, jumpers, hats, lunchboxes and drink bottles. For students from years 3 – 6 it is also helpful if you can label your child's shoes, as we often have many students with the same style of shoes which get mixed up after prayer time.

We thank our parents for their ongoing support and look forward to working with them in 2023.

And a very warm Welcome to the Australian Islamic College kindergarten community. Hopefully In sha Allah you are safe and in best of your health. I am very excited and proud to share our learning journey at the kindergarten for term 1, 2023.

Our learning goal for the term was to make children feel safe, secure and supported when attending the service. It was a rocky road; however, we have nearly achieved our goal with collaborative approach with the parent community.

As our curriculum is child based aiming at a child's holistic development, we did incorporate some topics that sparked with children's interest like exploration of body parts, supermarkets and scientific properties of objects that make them sink and float. Children's interests were extended to another level like learning body parts in Kurna language and Arabic language touching our culture and diversity principle.



Children did learn about the various things that are acceptable and unacceptable through their active participation and finally it formed the list of our room expectations in the form of red and green choices. Concept of personal space, empathy, hands to ourselves and privacy is being practiced consistently at our learning times.

Jolly Phonic sounds and letters from the first group were taught explicitly with hands on activities that catered for individual learning. Making letters and writing on smart board was a highlight. Number from 1-10, shapes, calendar and practising roll call participation was done regularly throughout the term.

Islamic, Quranic and Arabic studies included topics like five pillars of Islam with their meaning, Shahada, Surah Al Fatiha, 10 Names of Allah, etiquettes for reading duas or Qur'anic recitation and dua before mealtimes. Meaning of Ramadan and its practices was discussed.

As a part of cultural celebration harmony day was discussed and activity around it was included in the program. The most awaited photo day was done and sunnah day was celebrated as a fund-raising activity.

Reception

Dear Parents and Caregivers,
Asslaam-U-Alaikum

Amazing effort everyone! In such a short time despite the challenge of transitioning to a new Reception class, all young learners coped very well with the pressures and expectations of transition phase. Majority of our Receptions have attended school regularly and smoothly blended in new routines. Our students have shown an amazing level of resilience to respond to change. In this article we are going to share snippets of our settling down phase and learning in areas of the curriculum.

ENGLISH

In this area, students have been working this term to acquire proficiency in identifying letter/sound knowledge and using this skill to blend and segment sounds in words. Most of our students have used these skills to have a go at decodable readers. Students have been exposed to various literacy texts with the focus on looking at the book covers and characters. Students were encouraged to predict the text, identify characters and to describe characters using descriptive vocabulary.



MATHEMATICS

In Mathematics, our focus was on identifying numerals 0 to 10, 2D shapes, patterns, and attributes such as long/short, big/small, few/many. Students were engaged in hands on learning activities as well as book work around these topics.

HASS, ARTS, DIGITAL TECHNOLOGIES

Receptions have explored the concept of All about Myself and family. They have learnt vocabulary related to this topic. In arts students have been practicing their fine motor skills through art activities involving cutting, pasting, gluing, painting, and drawing. Students have been exploring the concepts of hardware, software and peripheral devices in digital technologies.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

This term Receptions have been involved in a Hockey introductory Clinic through the school sports program. Students have also participated in Harmony Day celebrations. We have explored concept of harmony through stories, songs, and art works. Here is gallery of photos from Reception's learning journey in Term 1.

Year 1

We would like to congratulate our Year 1 students for a fantastic start to 2023!

The Year 1 students have settled into the daily routines of their classrooms. The school year has commenced by engaging students in tasks based around the 4 Core Values to ensure a smooth start to the 2023.

Mathematics

Students have been focusing on Number and are engaging in tasks that include recognising and ordering numbers to 120. We have been continuing to extend our knowledge by counting forwards and backwards by 2's, 5's and 10's.

English

Students are encouraged to read aloud each night using the borrowed books from the library. Parents are encouraged to talk to them about the book and ask them questions such as:

What happened at the beginning, middle and end of the story?

What was the problem in the story?

Who was the main character of the story?

In Writing students had fun learning about how to write a Recount. Ideas included 'Going on bear hunt' and 'Visiting Mars' during the holidays.



Visual Art

This Term Year 1 students were studying techniques that different artists use to produce their artworks. Students have enjoyed using their creativity to recreate artworks inspired by artists such as Georgia O'Keeffe, Claude Monet, Henri Matisse and Vincent van Gogh. Students have applied their painting skills, drawing skills and cutting skills to produce some fantastic artworks.

Health

This term in Health, students have learnt about the importance of accepting each other and respecting each other's similarities and differences. Students have learnt about the importance of friendship and have discussed what makes a good friend. Another focus has been about identifying the different rules that exist in different environments such as the playground, school and community. Students have also learned about making positive and negative choices and having a growth mindset.



Physical Education

For Physical Education this term, students have enjoyed playing games that focus on fundamental movement skills such as running, throwing, hopping, jumping, sliding and skipping. Students have been practicing these skills through playing various games such as tunnel ball, participating in an obstacle course and playing chasey. Students have demonstrated great teamwork throughout the games.

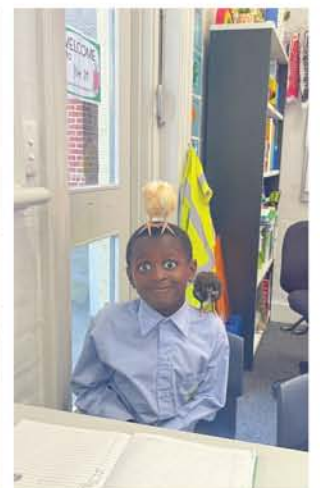


Primary – 2B

In Grammar we are focusing on parts of speech, tenses, and how to use a dictionary effectively.

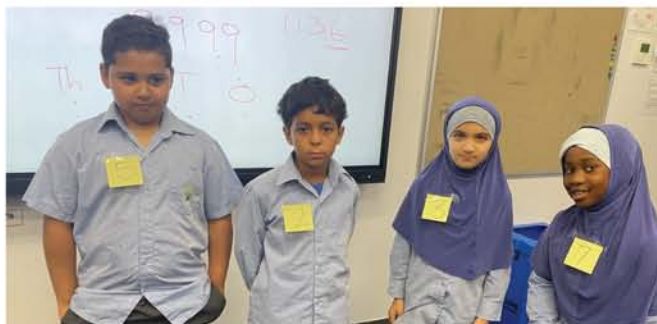
In Comprehension we have learnt about various strategies such as Visualising, Predicting, Inferencing and Cause and Effect using a range of picture books.

Assalamu alaikum dear parents/care givers,

Alhamdulillah, we have successfully made it to the end of Term 1. It was great to welcome students back to the new school year and see them settle in wonderfully. The start of the term saw students getting familiar with their new daily routines and schedules as well as participating in getting to know each other activities especially as we welcomed a few new faces to our AIC-A family.

Over the duration of the term, year 3 students have been learning a variety of curriculum content. In Mathematics students focused on the topic of Place Value. They participated in a number of lessons learning to recognise, model, represent and order numbers to at least 10 000 through explicit teaching and hands on activities.

The focus of our Science lessons has been on living and non-living things. Students engaged in a number of activities that required them to explore the differences between living, once living and products of living things and they enjoyed sorting living and non-living things based on their characteristics.

During English lessons we have been focusing on Narrative writing using the 7 Steps to Writing Program. Students have made positive improvements in their writing skills by using more descriptive language of 'showing' rather than 'telling'. They have become more familiar in using the 5 senses to describe the setting of their stories as well as banning boring words and using more interesting vocabulary.

Students have also been busy creating Ramadan decorations to be displayed in preparation for the holy month. In visual art lessons students created their own colourful interpretations of Romero Britto's artwork.

Overall, despite the stresses of NAPLAN testing, it has been a productive term that has allowed students to reflect on their strengths and weaknesses, be able to set and achieve their goals as well as develop their confidence and meet some new friends.

We are looking forward to a productive and eventful year ahead Insha'Allah!

What an amazing term we've had in Year 4! The students have had a lively term full of exciting challenges and opportunities, all the while demonstrating the four core values of the school (Being ready for learning, Exemplifying the Deen of Islam, Always respectful and safe, Being determine to Succeed). They have been learning how to effectively manage their time at home to complete homework, revise their daily work and cultivate a growth mindset to all learning tasks.

In English, the students have been exploring the art of storytelling using the Seven Steps program. They have been generating unique ideas and mapping out their narratives, crafting compelling character arcs and exciting plotlines. Jolly Phonics has been integrated into their spelling lessons, while daily grammar exercises have been helping them hone their writing skills. In Comprehension, they have been learning to activate prior knowledge, make connections and ask questions, all while exploring a range of thought-provoking texts.

In Maths, the students have been mastering the properties of odd and even numbers, place values, and the addition of five-digit numbers using various strategies. They have also been revising their daily times table to maintain accuracy and speed.

In Science, the students have been delving into the intricacies of ecosystem conservation, studying the Daintree Rainforest and the various biological cycles related to food chains. They have researched the many different birds and animals that live there, from cassowaries to green frogs and they have also been learning about habitats and how they affect the maintenance of the food chain.

In HASS, the students have been exploring the history of Australia's First People and have gained a deeper understanding of the injustices of the past. We are looking into future excursion to the South Australian Maritime Museum to see a year 4 program they are running called Encounters, the subject of which is what life was like for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples before the arrival of the Europeans.



In Digital Citizenship, the students have been learning about their digital footprint and how to use internet safely and responsibly, while in Health they have been focusing on forming respectful relationships and tackling the issue of bullying.

In Physical Education, the students played volleyball and tennis, developing their skills under the guidance of both their PE teacher and visiting Sports Coach. They showed impressive teamwork and sportsmanship.

In the Art class, students had the wonderful opportunity to explore various means of self-expression. They were encouraged to embrace their unique identities through creating personalized name tags, self-portraits, and 'Get to know me cubes'. Year 5

Assalamualaikum!

Literacy and Numeracy have been a key focus in our classrooms this term.

We commenced the year using Seven Steps Writing and the sizzling starters in both narrative and persuasive writing. We are impressed with the imagination and progress the students have made since initiating this program last year.

Maths this term has included the strategies of problem solving as well as word problems based on all four operations. We have been estimating, ordering and comparing numbers up to 100,000.

Year 5 students have undertaken NAPLAN testing, which was earlier in the year, compared to previous years. As usual, Lexile testing is carried out regularly. We strongly urge you to ensure your child is reading each night for 30 minutes.

AIC has always been fortunate in securing specialist coaching for sports. This term the Year 5s enjoyed developing their skills in Tennis, Netball and Auskick (Australian Rules football). Don't forget the Primary School Sports Day will be held on Friday 5th of May (Term 2 week 1). Students are encouraged now to get their team colours together.

Harmony Day is the highlight for our students each year. This year is no exception. As you might expect, the students proudly went out of their way to either wear their home county costumes or adorn themselves in all shades of orange.

The students have been intrigued by the history of Bushrangers in Australia especially during the 1800s. All students actively participated in lessons especially during thought provoking sessions where they had to think about whether Ned Kelly and his gang were Villains or Heroes, especially from an Islamic perspective. In Science, students investigated plant and animal adaptations to enable them to survive in sometimes very harsh environments. They learnt about Structural, Behavioural and Physiological changes.

Managing behaviours in our Health lessons has helped our students to deal with good, bad and changing relationships as well as developing strategies to deal with emotions

We have also investigated sun safety. We explored how to best look after ourselves when we are in the sun. In doing this, students explored how the sun affects their skin, what the UV Index is and what we can use to protect ourselves on days where the UV is extreme.

PE has involved learning all the rules and scoring for tennis and well as the techniques for all the skills. We have seen some great doubles games played by our students who have also shown great success in using the somewhat complex scoring system.

Technologies has been about simple machines. We have identified what simple machines are and where we have seen them in our local environment. From there we went to complex machines and how they help make our daily lives better.

The Year 7 students explored the 'On the Beach' unit and learned relevant expressions and vocabulary, reading comprehension, spelling, sentence construction, grammar and handwriting. The students examined various styles of creative writing in order to write their own composition about their experiences and activities on the beach.

The Year 8 students enjoyed the 'Rabbit and the Hare' story. In addition to reading comprehension and sentence construction activities, students examined the singular, dual, plural nouns in Arabic and compared them to their counterparts in English. They conjugated the present tense verb with the third person pronouns and the past tense verb with all pronoun groups. The students will be experimenting with writing their own narratives.

The Year 9 students studied a unit on 'Hobbies'. They familiarised themselves with the necessary terms and vocabularies to express meaning. They conjugated the present tense verb with the second and third person pronoun groups and learnt parts of speech; verbs, subjects, objects, prepositions and adverbs. Students could choose either to produce a text on their Hobbies or to develop a dialogue to present orally in order to reflect on their learning.

The Year 7s have had a bit of an intense start with the NAPLAN tests conducted this term alongside the vigorous curriculum expectations of their first year of high school. They worked diligently on their fantasy narrative writing and produced some interesting stories.

The theme for Year 7 and 8 Islamic Studies this term was Akhlaaq and Adab. The year 7s looked at gheebah, keeping promises, playing fair, keeping good relations, using the tongue correctly. The year 8s investigated inner and outer modesty, our code of

conduct based on justice, istighfar, animal cruelty, oaths, and vows. We have had some intriguing discussions and debates which helped students understand the essence of Muslim character. The Year 10s have been introduced to their first SACE subjects, IPP and PLP. IPP allows students to use technology to design and implement information processing solutions, and identify, choose, and use the appropriate computer hardware and software to process, manage and communicate information in a range of contexts.

The Personal Learning Plan (PLP) is a compulsory subject at Stage 1. The PLP helps students to plan for their future and assists them in choosing the subjects they will study in Years 11 and 12. Students must achieve a C grade or better to successfully complete the subject and have been working diligently to achieve this. English & Research Project

Year 8 English

In Term 1 students read the novel *Mahtab's Story* by Libby Gleeson. Many activities evolved from this text such as students analysing the book cover, completing an alternate cover, answering chapter-by-chapter questions, and analysing a newspaper or magazine article by pointing out the language features and structures contained in the article. Regular vocabulary activities culminating in weekly tests were also held, plus EP (Education Perfect) activities.

Year 9 English

This term the Year 9 students studied the novel *Animal Farm* by George Orwell. The novella is a fable about a group of animals that rebel over their living conditions and due to this bring about drastic changes in their lives. Students wrote a front-page newspaper article about the animals' revolt, and these were impressively written, using active voice, and accompanied by relevant visuals. They then went onto write a persuasive piece entitled: 'Should we eat meat?' They considered the positives and negatives associated with meat eating and wrote a 5-paragraph essay using the TEEL method. Students completed regular vocabulary activities and tests and participated in NAPLAN testing.

Year 10 English

Students in Year 10 studied fairy tales this term. Their task was to write a fractured fairy tale. This proved to be both challenging and yet interesting, as students considered how to change the story but ensure the integrity of the original story remained. Students also wrote an extended response whereby they analysed

one fairy tale, considered its worth in a contemporary society and as a piece of literature. Students then wrote descriptive pieces. The primary purpose of this type of writing is to describe a person, place, or thing in such a way that a picture is formed in the reader's mind.

Year 10 Personal Learning Plan (PLP)

The PLP is the first SACE subject undertaken by students in South Australia. It is a semester long subject that entails students considering subject selections for Year 11 and 12, as well as thinking about possible university courses, VET subjects and eventual career pathways. Students will generally complete four to five tasks, visit a Careers Expo, and also a tertiary institution. Our students have completed two tasks this term. The first was about the Seven SACE Capabilities and the second is about the Personal and Social Capability. Both tasks are highly relevant to our students as each task introduces them to the SACE and to possible future pathways.

Year 11 Research Project B

The Research Project B is a Stage 2 SACE subject that students usually undertake in Year 11. It provides students the opportunity to study an area of interest. There are three sections to the Research Project, the first is a 10-page folio, the second a 2000-word Research Outcome and the third a 1500-word Evaluation. Students have been working on their Folios since late last year. They have decided upon a plethora of topics and their 10-pages are well underway. This subject will be finalised later this year and will be the first Stage 2 credits that students achieve. They must pass this subject with a C- overall grade or higher.

HASS & Maths

Year 8 Maths

The students gained advanced knowledge in 'Indices and Integers'. They practiced the exercises in the relevant chapter and then engaged in Educational perfect (EP) exercises online to hone their accuracy. When they secured a good grip of this mathematical concept, the students moved on to 'Fractions and Decimals'. After this concept, they engaged in 'Algebra' exercises. The students were assessed on these topics in class.

Year 7 Maths

The students practiced the concept of indices and integers and their relation value on a number line. They developed higher order thinking to master the skill to compare and order integers. Students were supported to bring back to memory concepts they learned in the Primary to sharpen their memory to tackle any assessments of their standard. 'Factorization, Fractions, and Multiples' was the next topic for study. Students were supported to complete exercises from their Maths Text and Educational Perfect Exercises (EP) for more practice.

Year 7 History

A timeline of ancient Roman history created by the year seven students gave a good start to their learning process. They researched, shared, discussed, and presented their summative on a still standing ancient Roman mystery. They finished their learning by creating either a picture or a model of special artefacts of the Roman era. The students created a beautiful timeline of Prophet Mohamed (PBUH) and a timeline of their life. The whole learning process was informative and exciting.

Year 8 History

Students researched and analyzed the customs, traditions, crime and punishment practiced by the people and the society during the medieval era. They also investigated the lives of the Japanese during the Shogunate Era. The two studies of diverse cultures enlivened their minds and enabled them to make a comparison of ancient times with the changes in present modern society.

Year 9 History

The students drew out the causes and effects of World War 1, discovering the damages and destruction that wars could bring to society. In this context, they differentiated the meaning of the words, 'need and want' in relation to countries and their neighbours. The students analyzed information of 'the Industrial Revolution' and the discovery of machines, which gave rise to the development of devices and appliances in modern times.

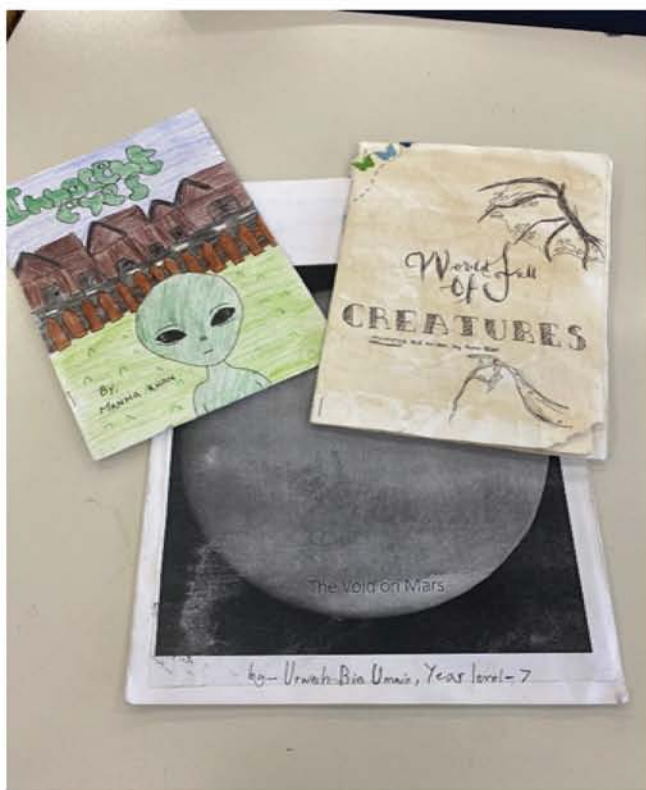

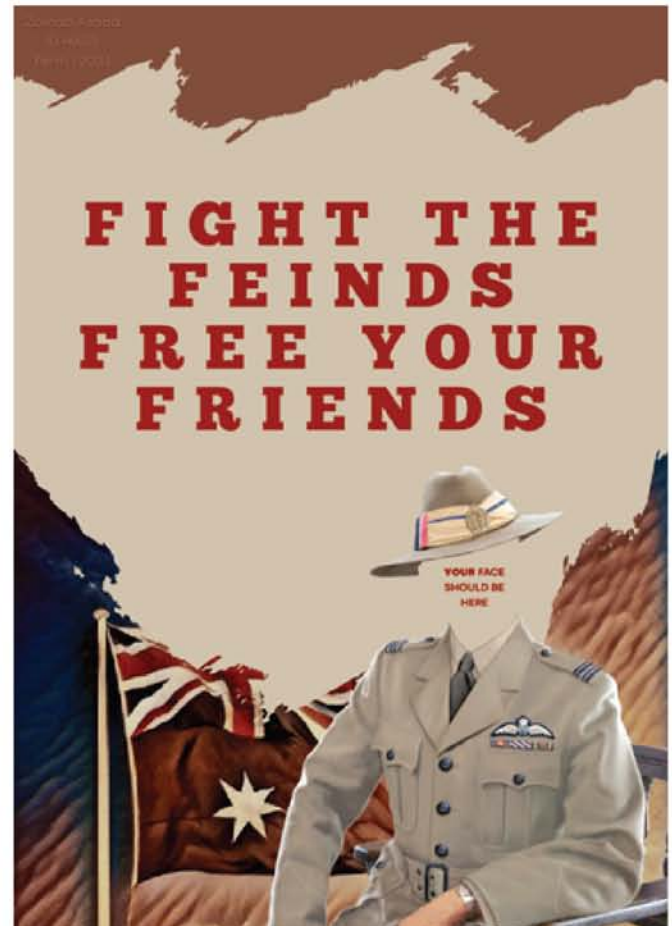
